

Natural disasters and resilience: (The Great East Japan Earthquake, 11 March 2011)



 There is a limit on the extent to which large natural disasters can be prevented

The concept of resilience with flexible adaptation to these situations is vital

 How can a "resilient society" be created that can respond both to sudden disasters and to gradual transformations (e.g. climate change)

Working Group Discussions

Participants Split into Three Working Groups:

- I) Capturing and Promoting Resilience in SEPLs including Disaster Risk Management
- 2) Sharing Experiences of Restoring SEPLs
- 3) Revitalizing local communities through enhancing traditional knowledge and empowering young successors

Each Working Group had Three Objectives:

- Identify "needs and challenges"
- 2) Discuss "strategies" for addressing these needs and challenges
- 3) Develop suggested priority "actions" for IPSI members

Working Group I: Capturing and Promoting Resilience in SEPLs including Disaster Risk Management

Facilitators: Fumiko Fukuoka (UNDP) and Wanja Dorothy Nyingi (KENWEB)

Classified Needs /Challenges, Strategies, and Actions into three sub-groups:

- I) Indicators to Capture and Measure Resilience
- 2) Multi-level Governance
- Disaster Risk Reduction, Adaptation, Restoration and Transformation





Working Group 2: Sharing Experiences of Restoring SEPLs

Facilitators: Yoko Watanabe (GEF Secretariat) and Krishna Chandra Paudel (Government of Nepal)

This working group broke into two sub-groups focusing on the topic from the Global Level and Country Level.

Suggested actions included:

I) Further Conceptualize/Define Satoyama

2) Development of a Communications Strategy

3) Assessment/Study on Potential Funding Opportunities for SEPLs

4) Development of Monitoring System



Follow-up Action to IPSI-2

Action Templates were shared with IPSI Members and uploaded to the website.

These templates included all:
I)Identified needs/challenges
2)Strategies for addressing these needs/challenges
3)Suggested priority actions for IPSI members





Compilation of List of Potential Areas for IPSI Collaboration

But IPSI-2 Public Forum produced so much material that Action Templates were 15 pages long!

To provide a more concise overview of IPSI-2 Public Forum outcomes, a list of 18 key areas for potential collaboration was compiled and broken down into seven main categories:

- I) Further Conceptualize/Define Satoyama and SEPLs
- 2) Indicators of Resilience in SEPLs
- 3) Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) and Adaptation; Restoration and Transformation of SEPLs
- 4) Funding Mechanisms
- 5) Creating Synergy between Traditional Knowledge and Modern Science
- 6) Branding and Certification
- 7) Approach to Policy and Governance Issues

Maximizing IPSI-2 Outcomes

After compiling the list of key areas for collaboration, this outcome fed into two areas:

I) IPSI Strategy Development (consideration and inclusion of key activities)

2) IPSI Collaborative Activities (discussion among IPSI members about potential for new collaboration)

Collection and Sharing of Expressions of Interest (EOIs)

The list was also shared with all current IPSI members, who were encouraged to submit "Expressions of Interest" to the Secretariat (70+ EOIs collected)

These were then compiled by the Secretariat and shared with members to help them identify possible synergies or areas for collaboration



Next Steps

- IPSI-3, provides further opportunities to continue discussions with IPSI members towards strengthening existing collaboration and exploring new opportunities.
- IPSI-3 Public Forum working group topics were developed based on strong response from members at IPSI-2.
