IPSI Case Study Review - Overview





- Knowledge sharing is one of IPSI's key functions
- Members are required to submit at least one case study on their activities on SEPLS
- The case study entails rich and diverse information
- Need a systematic review of all the case studies to;
 - Identify the current focus area and trends;
 - Identify and synthesize the lesson learned;
 - Identify improvement of IPSI as a platform for synergy creation and knowledge sharing


IPSI Case Study Review - Result



- 80 cs had been reviewed.
- In over 80% of submitted cs focus at a local scale.
- The majority come from Asia, followed by Americas and Africa.
- The majority of the cs present **agriculture** and **forestry** as the main means of livelihood.
- There is a clear dominance of **knowledge** and **awareness-based approaches**.
- In order to understand the thematic areas and lessons, seven themes were identified.
- CS mostly address landscape and seascape conservation and knowledge consolidation, followed by livelihood securing and well-being enhancement.
- Number of key lessons learned under seven themes are:

Satoyama Initiative Thematic Review - Overview



- In order to further strengthen IPSI's knowledge-facilitation functions, annual publication, Satoyama Initiative Thematic Review was initiated.
- It is a collection experiences and relevant knowledge, particularly from practitioners working on the ground.
- It is to clarify its relevance to **policy and academic discussion** and to help make **lessons learned** practical in the field.
- Theme of the 1st vol. is, "enhancing knowledge for better management of SEPLS", to identify tools and approaches used by and with local communities and other stakeholders, with 3 Sub-theme;

Theme A: Listening to & presenting community perspective on SEPLS

Theme B: Learning from experience

Theme C: Measuring multidimensional aspects of SEPLS

- SEPLS management in 13 countries.
- Peer-review and face-to-face discussion among the authors were conducted to complete the publication.

Help to keep decision-makers better informed


4. Awareness-raising,
